JUSTICE FOR OUR NEIGHBORS

Iowa Justice For Our Neighbors (JFON) provides free professional legal services for low-income immigrants in their immigration process. Two attorneys serve in Iowa to help people like Maria, who came to the United States in 1985 from El Salvador. Guerrillas had threatened to kill Maria and her family. They burned her cornfield and killed her neighbors.

Maria fled for her life, seeking asylum in the United States. Through several court appeals she was eventually allowed to apply for a work permit each year; but no action was taken on her asylum petition. In 2005 she had her asylum interview and the

judge denied her plea, stating that there was no longer any danger to her in El Salvador.

However, JFON discovered that Maria was eligible for Legal Permanent Residence. They were able to terminate her removal and helped her with the application and 120 pages of supplemental documents and information needed by Immigration. In May 2009, Maria was granted legal permanent residency. After all these years, Maria can live a little more at peace with her husband and four children, who are U.S. citizens by birth.
